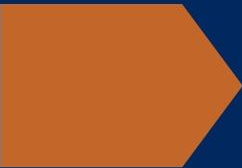

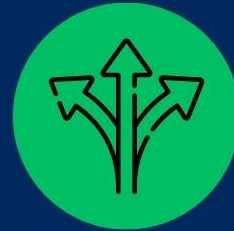

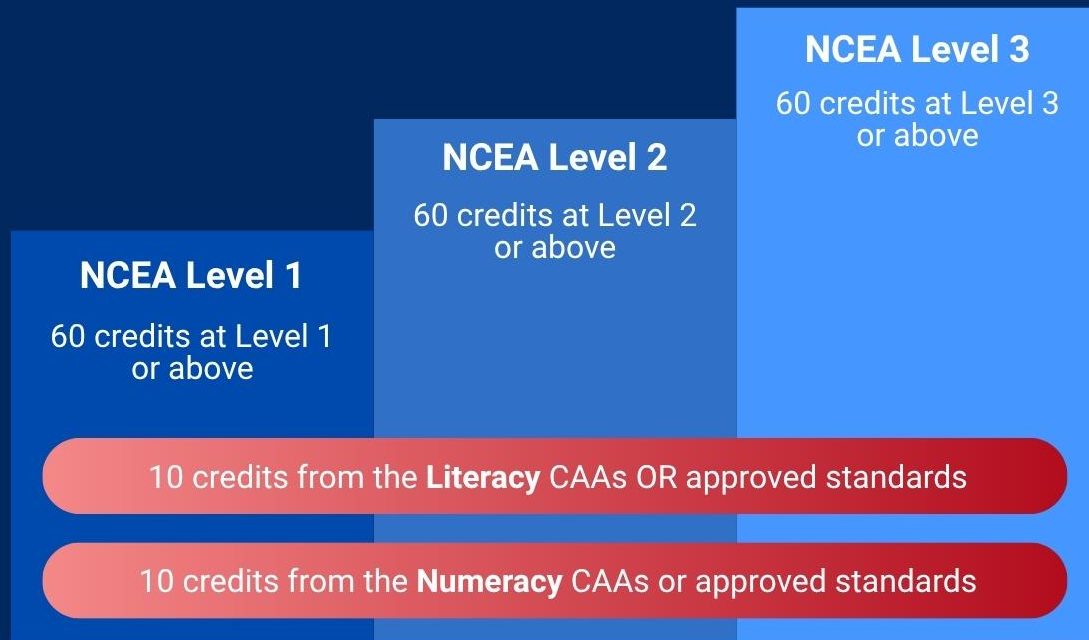

University Entrance (UE)

Planning on going to university after Year 13?

You will need University Entrance (UE) to go directly from school to university. To be awarded UE, you will need all of the following:

-  NCEA Level 3
-  14 credits in each of three approved subjects at Level 3
-  UE Literacy – 10 credits at Level 2 or above (5 in reading, 5 in writing) in specified standards.
-  UE Numeracy – 10 credits at Level 1 or above in specified standards.

Applying to universities with UE:

- Universities have their own requirements for admission to programmes.
 - The University of Auckland requires you to have UE Literacy + a minimum of 17 credits in English at Level 2 and/or 3.
- Check with the university you wish to attend what its requirements are.
- UE results are usually released at the end of January, and the universities you have applied to will get a notification of your results.

The more Merits and Excellences you get at Level 2 and 3, the better chances you will have of getting into the course of your choice at university.

ENG100 Level 1 English 20 credits available

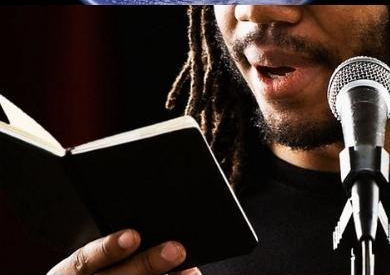
Level 1 NCEA English introduces students to a broad range of texts and essential language skills. The course focuses on developing reading, writing, and oral communication abilities through the study of literature, film, and language. Students will learn to analyse and respond to different texts, enhancing their understanding of themes, characters, and language techniques. Assessments include internal and external assessments that measure students' proficiency in comprehension, text analysis, and writing. This level lays a strong foundation for further study in English and cultivates thinking and effective communication skills.

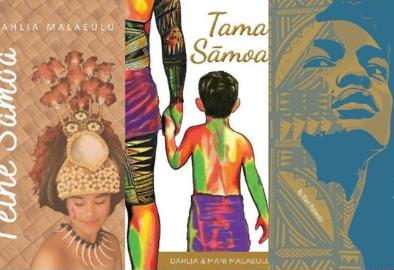
ENG200 Level 2 English 21 credits available (UE Reading & Writing credits)

Level 2 NCEA English is designed to build on the skills developed in Level 1, enhancing students' abilities in reading, writing, and critical analysis. The course covers a range of texts, including literature and film, encouraging students to think deeply about themes, character development, and language techniques. Assessments include both internal and external exams, focusing on written and oral communication and text analysis. This course prepares students for further academic study and develops essential skills for effective communication and critical thinking in everyday life.

ENG300 Level 3 English 18 credits available (UE Approved Course)

Level 3 NCEA English aims to refine students' analytical and communication skills. The course involves in-depth study of various texts, including films and short stories, fostering advanced critical thinking and interpretive abilities. Students will engage in both internal and external assessments, which focus on sophisticated text analysis, research, and perceptive judgements. This level emphasises independence in learning and the ability to construct and articulate complex ideas effectively.





Māori & Pacific Voices (English)

MPV200 Level 2 Māori and Pacific Voices 20 credits available (UE Reading & Writing credits)

This is an alternative Level 2 English course that explores Māori and Pasifika stories and the perspectives they offer on Māori and Pasifika people, cultures, and experiences. The course focuses on developing practical English skills, including creating visual texts and speaking to an audience. Students will also have opportunities to develop personal responses and produce creative writing to a publishable standard.

This course is mainly an internals-only Achievement Standards course. There may be an opportunity to complete the Unfamiliar Texts external assessment, but this will be negotiated with the class.

MPV300 Level 2 Māori and Pacific Voices 18 credits available (UE Approved Course)

This alternative Level 3 English course explores Māori and Pasifika stories and the perspectives they offer on Māori and Pasifika people, cultures, and experiences. Students will create visual texts, deliver presentations to an audience, critically respond to connections between studied and personally selected texts, and produce creative writing to a publishable standard. Building on the skills developed in Level 2, this course requires students to think more critically, make insightful connections across a range of texts, and communicate their ideas with greater independence and sophistication. It is well-suited to students who enjoy exploring Māori and Pasifika stories while developing the advanced literacy skills needed for further study, work, and life.

This course is an internals-only Achievement Standards course. There may be an opportunity to complete the Unfamiliar Texts external assessment, but this will be negotiated with the class.

EAL012 Level 1 & 2 English as an Additional Language **25+ credits available**

This course is suited for students who speak English as a second language or come from a background where English is not the main language used at home. This course aims to strengthen basic English skills in reading, writing, speaking, and listening at Levels One and Two. Students are mostly assessed through English Language Unit Standards appropriate to their language proficiency.

EAL234 Level 2 & 3 English as an Additional Language **25+ credits available**

This course aims to further develop basic English skills in reading, writing, speaking and listening. Students are assessed through English Language Unit Standards at the level of the student's proficiency. Some Year 13 students needing UE Literacy credits may opt to undertake independent research English for Academic Purposes Unit Standards.

SAM100 Level 1 Gagana Sāmoa **20 credits available**

This course builds on Year 10 learning and develops students' ability to express ideas, opinions, and experiences in Gagana Sāmoa. Key topics include family, church, and school, alongside cultural values like tautua (service) and fa'aaloalo (respect). Students will also take part in practical cultural activities such as the 'ava ceremony and learning Samoan table customs. Open to all students, including those who didn't take Gagana Sāmoa in Year 10.

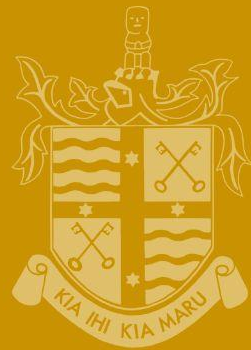
SAM200 Level 2 Gagana Sāmoa **20 credits available**

This course extends students' ability to justify ideas in Gagana Sāmoa across everyday and cultural contexts. It deepens understanding of Samoan values, customs, and community practices while building fluency in speaking and writing. Students gain confidence using the language in both formal and informal settings, with experiences like preparing for fa'alavelave, delivering speeches, and taking traditional roles in family events. Open to all students, including those who didn't take Gagana Sāmoa in Year 11.

SAM300 Level 3 Gagana Sāmoa **24 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

This advanced course deepens students' understanding of Samoan identity, customs, and communication. It refines speaking and writing skills while exploring complex cultural ideas. Practical experiences include preparing fa'alupega, delivering formal speeches, and leading or supporting 'ava ceremonies and service roles. Open to all students, including those who didn't take Gagana Sāmoa in Year 12.

MAT100 Level 1 Mathematics **15 credits available**

This course focuses on developing students' understanding of mathematical concepts and their application to abstract and real-world situations. Students will explore a variety of approaches to problem-solving and learn to use effective means for modelling, analysing and interpreting patterns and relationships. MAT100 consists of three Achievement Standards and will prepare students for further studies in Calculus and Statistics in Years 12 and 13.

NUM100 Level 1 Numeracy **10 credits available**

This course aims to develop the core mathematical skills applicable to various real-world contexts. It is designed to support students to gain confidence in everyday mathematics and broaden their understanding to achieve 10 numeracy credits offered in Common Assessment Activities.

MAC200 Level 2 Calculus 17 credits available

This course focuses on developing advanced algebra skills to solve complex real-world problems. In addition, students will learn foundational Calculus and graphical methods. It is intended to prepare students for Year 13 Calculus and tertiary studies requiring a sound mathematical understanding.

MAS200 Level 2 Statistics 17 credits available

This course focuses on developing students' understanding of data analysis and their ability to integrate statistical features with contextual knowledge. Students will learn to interpret information, evaluate arguments, and deal with chance, which will allow them to assess statistical information encountered on a day-to-day basis.

MAC300 Level 3 Calculus **19 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

This course focuses on advanced Mathematics and Calculus concepts along with their application to complex problems. It is designed to prepare students for a multitude of university studies that rely on sound mathematical understanding, such as Engineering, Physics and Economics.

MAS300 Level 3 Statistics and Modelling **18 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

This course focuses on complex statistical processes, including collection, analysis and interpretation of data. Students will develop their critical thinking and analytic skills, formulate an investigation, and write and critique formal reports. The course is designed to prepare students for a multitude of university studies that rely on sound statistical understanding.

SCI100 Level 1 Science - General Science **20 credits available**

Students will develop their understanding of Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Students will carry out internal and external assessments covering Conservation of mass, Genetics and Energy. This course enables a pathway into Biology, Chemistry and Physics in Years 12 and 13.



ESC100 Level 1 Science - Environmental Science **15 credits available**

Students will develop their understanding of science from cultural (i.e. Mātauranga Māori and Pacific) perspectives of our environment, such as our land, water, air and life. This course enables a pathway into Biology, Chemistry and Physics in Years 12 and 13. Credits are gained through three internal assessments.

SCI200 Level 2 Science **18-21 credits available**

This course covers standards from Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Earth Science, exploring topics related to life, the universe, and our place in it. It aims to build confidence and understanding in Physical Science while enhancing the ability to express scientific ideas. Students will also learn to apply scientific concepts to everyday life.

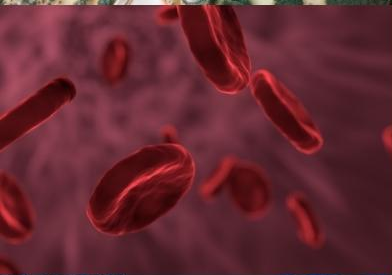

BIO200 Level 2 Biology **22 credits available**

This course builds on the biological concepts from SCI100 and ESC100, offering a deeper understanding of cellular processes and their role in genetic variation within populations. It is essential for those pursuing a career in biology.

BIO300 Level 3 Biology **18 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

This course covers the study of living things, including genes, cells, genetics, plants, animals, and evolution. It is designed for students interested in deepening their knowledge of biological sciences or pursuing further studies in this field after school.

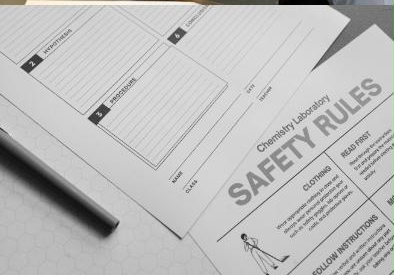
CHE200 Level 2 Chemistry **26 credits available**

Students will use authentic-looking scientific equipment, including large glassware and reactive chemicals. The course will cover fundamental concepts such as the names of elements and atomic structure, building on what students learned in Years 10 and 11. Through experiments and bookwork, you will learn to identify chemicals in solutions, assess their strength, and understand their reactions with other substances.



CHE300 Level 3 Chemistry **24 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

Chemistry is the study of matter, its composition, properties, and the changes it undergoes, including the energy involved. Students will apply their understanding of these fundamental concepts to interpret the world around them. This course is ideal for those who wish to deepen their knowledge of Chemical Sciences or pursue further studies in this field at tertiary level.

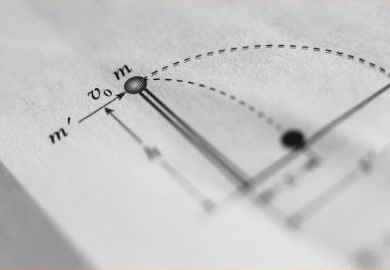

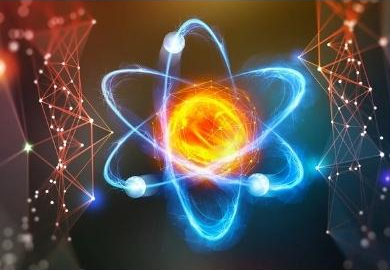

PHY200 Level 2 Physics 26 credits available

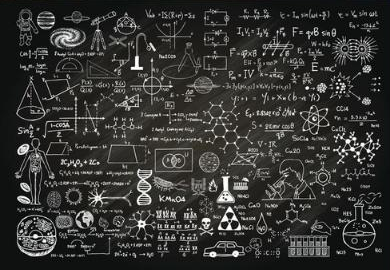
In this course, you will explore electricity, light, and mechanics, using mathematics to make predictions and solve problems in these areas. You will also develop practical skills to investigate each topic. This course is ideal for students with strong calculus or algebra skills or those planning to pursue further study at NCEA Level 3 or university.



PHY300 Level 3 Physics 20 credits available (UE Approved Course)

Physics is the study of light, heat, sound, electricity, magnetism, waves, forces, and motion, all unified by the concept of energy, which transforms from one form to another without loss. By studying physics, students gain an understanding of the interactions within the physical world and the various ways these interactions can be represented. This course is designed for students who wish to deepen their knowledge of physical sciences or pursue further studies in this field after leaving school.

Students who did **PHY200 or MAC200 will be prioritised** for this course.

GEO100 Level 1 Geography **15 credits available**

Level 1 Geography is about how people interact with the environment. You'll explore earthquakes, local microclimates, and Pacific issues, while building skills in mapping, graphing, and data analysis. You'll have the opportunity to go out and conduct real-world geographic research. This course is perfect for developing your research, analysis, and technical skills while discovering more about the world around you.



GEO200 Level 2 Geography **18 credits available**

Level 2 Geography looks at environmental and sustainability issues and how people connect with different places. You'll do practical research out in the environment, create digital maps, and analyse data to solve geographic problems. The course builds your skills in research, technology, and analysis, with a mix of independent and group work to prepare you for further study or real-world applications.



GEO300 Level 3 Geography **18 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

Level 3 Geography explores topics such as the patterns of coral reefs, the cultural and economic effects of NZ music festivals like Rhythm and Vines, and how maps are used to study spaces. You will also plan and carry out your own peer-led research project, which allows you to develop advanced mapping and analysis skills. Independent learning and strong research skills will help you succeed, especially if you are new to Geography.



History

HIS100 Level 1 History **19 credits available**

Level 1 History explores important events like the Vietnam War, the atomic bombings in World War Two, and the 1981 Springbok Tour. You'll learn how to research, analyse sources, and choose topics that interest you for your assessments. There's also a chance to earn Level 2 Art History credits while building your reading, writing, and critical thinking skills.



HIS200 Level 2 History **18 credits available (UE Reading & Writing credits)**

In Level 2 History, you'll explore in-depth topics such as the Second South African War, global genocides, and the US Civil Rights Movement. You will have the flexibility to research any historical topic you wish for your assessments. You will gain skills in research, source analysis, and making historical judgements. History at Level 2 is a literacy-heavy course, so bring along your strong reading and writing skills.



HIS300 Level 3 History **21 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

Level 3 History explores big questions about how the past is remembered and interpreted, with topics like the Cold War, the colonisation of the Hutt Valley, and 9/11. You'll develop advanced research, source analysis, and critical thinking skills, while debating ideas about politics, ideology, and justice. The course also offers Scholarship History for students who want an extra challenge and deeper exploration of historical themes.

MED100 Level 1 Media Studies **22 credits available**

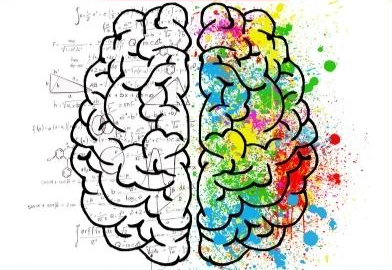
Level 1 Media Studies will look at how the media interacts with society. You will create marketing campaigns to accompany your research into media issues, while exploring how the internet and globalisation have made media industries more significant than ever before. You will also create podcasts and analyse media narratives.

MED200 Level 2 Media Studies **19 credits available (UE Writing credits)**

Level 2 Media Studies explores representation and ethics in the media. As you learn about media industries, you will plan and make your own media product, as well as an introduction to your adventure narrative script, which ties into our external study of the making of The Mandalorian.

MED300 Level 3 Media Studies **20 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

As a University Entrance approved subject, Level 3 Media Studies enhances your critical thinking and research skills, as you explore new developments in the media and representations in Aotearoa's media. You will script, plan, and make a media product of your choice, and study the rise of the superhero genre post-9/11, and how genres are tied to the society in which they are produced.

PSY200 Level 2 Psychology

16 credits available (UE Reading credits)

Level 2 Psychology is an internal-only course where you'll explore four main approaches selected from biological, behavioural, cognitive, humanistic, psychodynamic, and socio-cultural, to gain a deeper understanding of psychology. You'll dive into the basics of psychological research, including designing and conducting an experiment, analysing data, and addressing ethical considerations. The course also includes key areas, like mental health and the impacts of social interactions on behaviour. You will also engage with a study in addiction and psychological debates to broaden your understanding of the field.

PSY300 Level 3 Psychology

18 credits available (UE Approved Course)

This advanced course offers a more in-depth analysis of the reasons for our behaviour, like how our bodies affect our minds. You will do focused research using at least two different methods and critically explore the nature vs nurture debate in today's psychological theories. We will also look at how biases can influence the accuracy of these theories. Psychology at Level 3 is a literacy-heavy subject, meaning you'll do a lot of reading and writing. To succeed, you'll need good time management skills for completing research projects and be ready for more independent learning.

SOC200 Level 2 Sociology

18 credits available (UE Reading credits)

Sociology is all about studying how societies work and how people interact with each other. Students will complete Senior Social Studies NZQA standards. In this Level 2 Sociology course, you'll explore topics like human rights abuses in North Korea, government investigations, social movements for change, and the situation of the Uyghurs in China. You'll learn how to research and analyse these issues to understand their impact on people and communities. This engaging course involves group work to enact your own social actions and a drive to understand the world around you.

SOC300 Level 3 Sociology

20 credits available (UE Approved Course)

This Level 3 Sociology course will focus on how social actions can shape policy. Students will complete Senior Social Studies NZQA standards. Topics include youth movements like 350 Pacific, the Israel-Palestine conflict, and the protection of te reo Māori. Students will also engage with government processes to influence a policy of their choice. This course will help you understand and evaluate the impact of social actions and policies on communities.

PED100 Level 1 Physical Education **20 credits available**

In this course, you will apply your classroom learning through practical participation. You will identify and apply movement strategies in activities such as Kōwhiri, explore the te ao Māori concept of *kotahitanga* through multi-sport, and take part in ongoing personal movement experiences, such as pickleball, while reflecting on how these influence your *hauora*. You will also complete a Health achievement standard, where you will demonstrate your understanding of *hauora* and apply it to a health-related context.

PED200 Level 2 Physical Education **18-20 credits available**

PED200 focuses on advanced physical education and covers a range of topics such as biophysical principles, leadership and coaching strategies, quality movement, event planning, and the benefits of recreation. The course may include outdoor education activities like rope courses, rock climbing, kayaking, rafting, and hiking.

PED300 Level 3 Physical Education (UE Approved Course) **15-21 credits available**

The PED300 curriculum includes evaluating performance programmes, leadership, quality movement, and strategies for lifelong well-being. It may also feature outdoor education activities such as rope courses, rock climbing, kayaking, rafting, and hiking.

SVCADY1 Level 1 Services Academy **21 credits available**

This participatory Services course encompasses various physical activities, risk management, meeting activity standards, fitness principles application, goal setting, basic first aid, and outdoor confidence building. Students enhance individual performance, practice self-management in teamwork, improve fitness via diverse training, connect body function knowledge to activity, and develop leadership skills.



SVCADY2 Level 2 Services Academy **23 credits available**

This course equips students with life skills, motivation, vocational training, and team-building abilities to confidently integrate into the community. It emphasises adventure-based learning for personal and social development, communication, and teamwork. Students learn leadership and group dynamics, gaining confidence through outdoor activities like survival skills, tramping, and camping. They maintain fitness levels and experience military life, acquiring military skills. Life Skills 101 covers profiling, CV creation, financial management, and basic knowledge of property, business, and shares.



Note: Induction Course attendance in Term 1 is necessary for ongoing participation in the Services Academy. Exception requires approval from the Service Academy Director.

DRA100 Level 1 Drama **15 credits available**

In this course, you will work with others to bring characters, ideas, and stories to life through public performances. You will explore a range of drama styles and learn the key features that make each one unique. Along the way, you will develop your teamwork, creativity, confidence, and communication skills. Participation in public evening showcases is required.

DRA200 Level 2 Drama **18 credits available**

In this course, you will build on the skills developed in DRA100 by creating more detailed and convincing characters, devising original scenes with meaningful messages, and performing a range of established drama styles with confidence. Along the way, you will strengthen your leadership, creativity, confidence, and expressive communication skills. Participation in public evening showcases is required.

DRA300 Level 3 Drama **18 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

In this course, you will develop advanced performance skills to communicate complex characters, ideas, and stories to a live audience. You will take greater ownership of your learning by making creative decisions that strengthen your performance and interpretation. Through longer and more challenging scenes, you will explore a wider range of emotions, motivations, and dramatic techniques while developing your leadership and performance skills. Participation in public evening showcases is required.

In this course, you will explore the purpose of production technology in performance and learn how to follow a design plan to create work for a range of performance contexts. Along the way, you will build your creativity, time management, and collaboration skills while working with others. Participation in one evening showcase is required.

EVT200 Level 2 Event Technology **12 credits available**

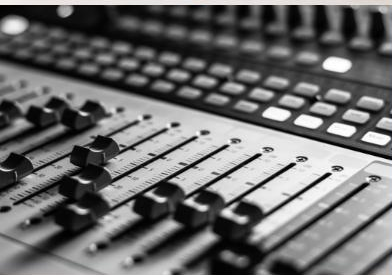

EVT300 Level 3 Event Technology **10 credits available**

In this course, you will specialise in one production technology area for the entire year. You will design and create a range of technical elements for performance contexts both in and outside of school, while exploring, experimenting, and refining your work to build a portfolio. Your portfolio will demonstrate how your designs effectively communicate the purpose of each performance context. Participation in events both inside and outside of school is required.

MUS100 Level 1 Music **15 credits available**

In this Level 1 Music course, students will build a strong foundation in performance, composition, theory, and music technology. You will improve solo and group performance skills on your main instrument or voice, develop music theory and listening skills, use a Digital Audio Workstation like Bandlab or Soundtrap, and create an original composition. Regular lessons from an instrumental or vocal teacher, either at school or externally, are essential for success in NCEA Music. You will also have several performance opportunities throughout the year.

MUS200 Level 2 Music **14 credits available**

In this Level 2 Music course, you will advance your solo and group performance skills on your main instrument and research a topic related to New Zealand music. The course will enhance your composition abilities with advanced recording techniques and music technology. You will also improve your theory and listening skills to refine your overall musicianship. There will be plenty of opportunities for you to perform throughout the year.

MUS300 Level 3 Music **18 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

In this Level 3 Music course, students will choose either Performance or Composition as their main focus. Performance students will enhance their solo and group skills to prepare for two recitals. Composition students will compose at least three pieces of music. All students will conduct in-depth research on a music topic of their choice and refine their harmonic and aural skills to elevate their musicianship. There will be many performance opportunities throughout the year, including student-organised events.

PPA100 Level 1 Pasifika Performing Arts (Dance)

15 credits available

This course introduces students to traditional and contemporary Pacific dance styles. Students will learn to express stories and cultural ideas through movement and create their own choreography in groups. The course builds confidence, teamwork, and an appreciation for the meaning behind Pacific dances. Participation in Poly Club performances is required. Students will collaborate and actively contribute to class activities.



PPA200 Level 2 Pasifika Performing Arts (Dance)

18 credits available

This course focuses on deepening your skills in Pacific dance and storytelling through movement. You'll explore traditional and contemporary styles, take creative leadership in choreography, and perform at key events like Multicultural Day and HuttFest. To succeed, you'll need to take initiative, work well with others, and be open to creative challenges. Participation in Poly Club and performances at school events and cultural festivals is required. Students must be willing to collaborate and actively contribute to class activities.



PPA300 Level 3 Pasifika Performing Arts (Dance)

18 credits available (UE Approved Course)

This Level 3 Dance course focuses on leadership in choreography, directing, costuming and music for Pacific dance. You'll lead and direct group performances, create music and performance concepts, and, later on, perform a solo or duet to show your skill and expression. Students will also help lead choreography for the year's many cultural events like Multicultural Day, HuttFest and further local events.

TAH100 Level 1 Te Ao Haka **15+ credits available**

Students in Level 1 Te Ao Haka discover, identify, and explore foundational knowledge and ideas about Te Ao Haka. Ākonga have the opportunity to grow into proud, confident, disciplined, resilient, accountable, hardworking, committed, and humble leaders who can work collaboratively. They will develop lifelong skills in manaaki, tiaki, aroha, whakapono, aumangea, tiaki wā, and tōngakingaki. The coursework combines practical activities with research and written tasks. There are no prerequisites for this course.

TAH200 Level 2 Te Ao Haka **15+ credits available**

Students in Level 2 Te Ao Haka explore and innovate within the framework of Te Ao Haka, experimenting with their roles and connections. The course encourages learning about both reo ā-waha and reo ā-tinana, helping students enhance their communication skills. It offers numerous opportunities to develop and demonstrate leadership, both on and off stage. The coursework includes a blend of practical activities, research, and written tasks. There are no prerequisites for this course.

TAH300 Level 3 Te Ao Haka **15+ credits available (UE Approved Course)**

In Level 3 Te Ao Haka, students refine their analysis and performance skills, effectively expressing narrative and embodying their work. Whanaungatanga is central to Te Ao Haka, helping students build bonds, cooperate, and work together. The course fosters creativity and expression, enhancing both performance skills and critical thinking. It includes a blend of practical activities, research, and written tasks. There are no prerequisites for this course.

ART100 Level 1 Art **20 credits available**

This course allows students to explore their identity through a Mātauranga Māori lens with the question, "Ko Wai Au?" Students will connect with their identity through concepts such as pepeha, whakapapa (genealogy), turangawaewae (where we are from), kaitiakitanga (guardianship), and taonga (precious gifts/items/family heirlooms) within their whānau and how these elements contribute to their personal story. Students who choose this course cannot take DEP100, as both courses are assessed against the same standards.

ARP200 Level 2 Art Painting **20 credits available**

This course develops your Level 1 Art skills, focusing on painting mediums. Students study artists' techniques through research and practical standards, applying these to their own work. Completing artwork as homework is crucial to meet the level's expectations. While most students will complete an external folio, an additional internal Achievement Standard is available for those who wish to do a fully internal course.

ARP300 Level 3 Art Painting **22 credits available (UE Approved Course)**

This course builds on the skills developed in Level 2 Art, with a focus on exploring painting mediums. Students will study various techniques used by established artists through research and practical achievement standards, applying this knowledge to enhance their own work. Regular homework is essential to meet the quantity and quality requirements at this level. While most students will complete an external folio, there is an additional internal achievement standard available for those who prefer a fully internal course.

DES100 Level 1 Design 20 credits available

This course is for students who enjoy graphic design, digital illustration, branding, typography, advertising, concept art and visual communication. Students learn how to develop creative ideas and solve design problems using Adobe Creative Suite while building a portfolio of practical design work.



DES200 Level 2 Design 20 credits available

Level 2 Design expands students' creative and technical skills through a range of authentic design briefs. Students will explore branding, advertising, publication, promotional graphics and digital illustration while strengthening their own visual style.



DES300 Level 3 Design 22 credits available (UE Approved Courses)

Level 3 Design is an advanced portfolio course for students considering further study or careers in design, advertising, digital media, illustration, game design or visual communication.

DIT100 Level 1 Digital Technologies

15 credits available

We use digital technologies to do our work, communicate, and entertain. We also use it to create new "stuff" for others. At Level 1, students will design, develop and evaluate digital outcomes. These include web pages (digital media), databases (managing information) and interactive games (programming). This course will also cover concepts of Digital Technologies. Applications used include Excel, Access, Photoshop, Notepad++ and Scratch.



DIT200 Level 2 Digital Technologies

17 credits available

At Level 2, students will learn to use advanced techniques to design, develop and evaluate digital outcomes. These include web pages (digital media), databases (managing data) and interactive games (programming). This course will also cover advanced concepts of digital technologies. Applications used include Excel, Access, Photoshop, Notepad++ and Animate/ActionScript.



DIT300 Level 3 Digital Technologies

14 credits available (UE Approved Course)

At Level 3, students will consolidate and build on their learning to design, develop and evaluate digital outcomes. These include web pages (digital media), relational databases (managing data) and interactive games (programming). Some students may be assessed using Unit Standards. Applications used include Excel, Access, Photoshop, Notepad++ and Animate/ActionScript.

HOS100 Level 1 Hospitality **24 credits available**

This course is an introduction to food preparation and safety in the hospitality industry. It has a mixture of practical and theory assessments. Students will study basic food safety and be introduced to food preparation techniques used in a commercial setting. Topics include various food groups, baking, hot finger foods, and mocktails.

HOS200 Level 2 Hospitality **21 credits available**

This course is designed to further students' skills and give them experience to prepare them for the hospitality industry. It has a mixture of practical and theory assessments, and students are required to participate in catering as part of the course and assessment. Students will look at food preparation as well as food and beverage service.

HOS300 Level 3 Hospitality **24 credits available**

This course gives students real-life experience in working in the hospitality industry. Students will partake in food and beverage service as well as food preparation for various school events. Students will learn about managing food hazards, coffee origins, and making pickles, chutneys, and preserves. The course also covers culinary terms and espresso preparation. This is not a university-approved course.

TEC100 Level 1 Hard Materials Technology **16 credits available**

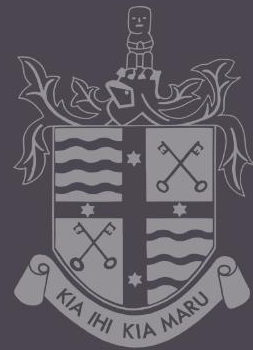
Students in Level 1 Hard Materials Technology will learn to layout and cut traditional wooden joinery to construct a Tool Tote and a Mortise and Tenon Stool. This will involve reading and interpreting project plans, and using a range of different hand tools plus some power tools. This course places an emphasis on safe workshop practice.

TEC200 Level 2 Hard Materials Technology **14 credits available**

Level 2 Hard Materials Technology involves the construction of two outdoor furniture projects. Students develop a deeper understanding of timber and other building materials while constructing items containing angles and somewhat complex designs. Throughout this process, students will be asked to consider in detail the hand tools that they are using in their work.

TEC300 Level 3 Hard Materials Technology **14 credits available**

Level 3 Hard Materials Technology involves the construction of projects with relatively complex designs. Students will learn about building materials and assembly processes while developing their skills in reading and interpreting plans, woodworking techniques, and using power tools—skills that are easily transferable to the professional trades. Although ready-made project plans will be provided, self-motivated, creative students may enjoy the potential for original design offered by this course.

Wellington Trades Academy

Wellington Trades Academy offers students a head start in education and skill development across various vocational pathways.

Students choose one area of interest and attend classes 1-2 days per week while continuing regular school for the remaining 3-4 days. The programme provides credits towards NCEA Level 2 or 3, ranging from 20 to 45 credits depending on the chosen course. Transport and necessary safety PPE are provided.

Before applying, thoroughly research the course to ensure it aligns with your interests and goals.

If you wish to apply for Trades Academy, **you must register your interest on School Bridge**. An application pack will then be given to you in LAR to complete. You need to be aware that the Trades Academy application process consists of completing an application form endorsed by the school, followed by an interview. Your attendance record and attitude to learning will be taken into consideration.

- b) want to explore specific career industries and pathways before moving on to further study.



Gateway experiences equip students with essential entry-level skills for the workplace, making them well-prepared for part-time work while pursuing tertiary studies.
